

Region 10 Is On A Roll: Membership Numbers Continue To Climb

I hope that most of our choruses participated in the Global Open House sometime during the month of September with a Guest Night or other special project to bring visitors through our rehearsal doors. A key element is follow-up: be sure to send a hand-written note to each woman who attended, thanking her for her interest and inviting her to come back. Even if she decides this is not the right time in her life to embrace our wonderful hobby, she will remember the personal interaction and will probably tell others of her experience. Don't just rely on email to connect with your guests - old-fashioned 'snail mail' is almost a novelty now and is wellreceived.

I find it interesting to track our region's membership numbers throughout the year. As of mid-September, we had 769 members, which is an increase of 10 since January. We have a total of 13 small choruses (15-30 members); 5 mid-size choruses (31-60

members) and 3 large choruses (61-plus members). Region 10 also has one chorus in Step 2 of the chartering process.

We may have even more members in the next six months: several former Sweet Adelines who relocated to Central Louisiana are interested in starting a chorus. Before they officially fill out the Prospective Chorus paperwork, they plan to host a free 'kickoff concert' to provide information about our organization to women in their community. That program is planned for Saturday, October 25 at 2 p.m. at Palestine United Methodist Church, 306 Tioga Road, Ball, LA and features Region 10's own Reunion Street Quartet. The quartet will perform a short program and will give the audience details about Sweet Adelines. Keep an eye on the regional Facebook page and Yahoo egroup for more information. If you know anyone who lives in that area, please tell them about this event. Anyone in our region is welcome to attend to lend support.

As we spend time and effort to bring in

new members to our choruses, it's equally important to recognize our existing members who keep the wheels turning each week. Region 10 has a host of award programs to spotlight their efforts throughout the year. Sweet Adeline Extraordinaire honorees were announced at Fall Regional. Next up: there will be at least (5) different membership/marketing awards given out during contest week – be sure to check the deadlines on the regional website under "Resources" (http://www.region10sai.org/) and encour-

age your choruses to participate. In addition, we still have regional Plus One pins to award to those women who are personally responsible for referring a new member to your chorus. Email me at Re-

Hello to all Region 10 directors,

What an outstanding Fall Regional workshop we had! Becki Hine's classes were excellent and I hope all of you have wonderful new ideas to take back to your choruses.

Our featured article is by Britt-Heléne Bonnedahl, the director of our International Champion Rönninge Show Chorus. She shares wonderful exercises for essentials of vocal health as she applies speech therapy to singing. Enjoy and have great rehearsals!

Essentials of Vocal Health

SPEECH THEIR APPLIED TO SINGING

Britt-Helene Bonnedahl

Criteria for Good Vocal Production

Support
Tension free phonation
Resonance

Exercises to build a healthy, strong speaking/singing voice

Support

Bubble

Speak or sing with a bubbling sound for at least a couple of minutes. Pretend telling a story to get attitude, dynamic and pitch variety in the voice.

Majestic counting

Count from 1-8, 1-9, 1-10 etc. with a powerful resonant voice. Use a lot of air, legato and attitude. Check on posture, flexed knees, drop-lift method.

Dramatic reading

Read from a book, newspaper or anything with a dramatic powerful voice. Record yourself from a distance to analyze if your voice carries the sound to a distance with good quality. This exercise builds up the strength in the musculus vocalis and gives you a chance to practice abdominal breathing continuously.

Tension Free Phonation - Exercises to enhance the flow in the vocal apparatus

To get the voice started in a relaxed way enhancing the flow and blood circulation in the vocal chords

Stand with correct posture, feet slightly apart

Raise your arms in a ballet position, sway slowly from side to side

Phonate rhythmically a V sound. Use a lot of air and a really clear V to create a little pressure

Essentials of Vocal Health, cont.

the lips for support. Make sure that you're relaxed. Check on neck, shoulders, flexed knees. It would be excellent if you move the neck and loosen up the neck/shoulder area at the same time. Go on until you feel like in a trance!

Add any vowel to the V sound. Still rhythmically, lots of air, no hard attacks on the vowels. Air, air and lots of air. Let the sound spin/float on the air. Embrace your vocal chords with air!

Stretches for the Larynx

Use your hands/fingers to actually feel the sensation with these stretches

Say a B, slowly and with support. While introducing it you can play and pretend that you're scaring someone.

Soft lips (Italian kissing flower lips), no hard sound. Feel the palate curve, stretching and promote a low larynx. Repeat many times.

Say - yobbom, mobbom, mob - repeat many times. Exaggerate every B sound to get the stretch.

Buh, buh, buh! Play around! Make rhythmical long strings of boh combinations. Move your body and strive for variety in attitude, pitch and inflection. (Some people don't get the right boh feeling until you make them feel almost like throwing up - an ugly feeling, but useful for some people.)

OBS! Try to really get your body involved to gain energy and get rid of tension. Any kind of tension free move/body involvement is fine - Just Move! Be aware of good posture, flexed knees, neck/shoulder area, tension free jaw.

Tongue Flexibility

The tongue has to be flexible to help with articulation and to be out of the way (like a carpet on a floor) to widen the resonant space.

Play with a rolling R. Move your body and use variety in pitch, attitude and inflection.

Trrrraw, trrraw. Repeat this "word" and exaggerate the rolling R while pretending you're grabbing a huge rope pulling it into your body. Use a lot of air when adding the vowel. No hard attacks on the vowel, just lots of air!

Leeh, leh, lah. Hold the tip of your tongue behind your lower teeth. Tip over the tongue and say leeh, leh, lah slowly and with support. Stretch the root of the tongue and lift the soft palate at the same time.

Play with the tongue. Forbidden behavior like all kind of plays you did when you were a kid, stretch it, flex it, flap it!

Essentials of Vocal Health, cont.

Make it Work, Make it Flexible!

Register Break

While doing these exercises, try to maintain a low larynx by holding your fingers with light pressure in the holes between the larynx and the hyoid bone. Don't worry about the unpleasant feeling. You'll get used to it very soon. This technique is helpful in difficult passages around the break in a song too.

Take any vowel, make a sound and glide around in your register, both really high, low and middle. Keep on with a light pressure to hold down the larynx and to maintain the space between the larynx and the hyoid bone.

"Paint" with your hands in front of you making a soft ooeeh sound, glide around in your register.

Move Your Body and Have Fun!

Resonance

Find long strings of words that contain a lot of ms and ns. Say them with a dramatic, powerful voice using exaggerated resonant spaces and good support.

Suggestions of long strings:

MMMMMMMM, many many marshmallows (Pretend enjoying the taste)

My MAMA makes me move! (Italian intensity)

Oh, no I'm getting hungry! (Desperation)

To really exercise the muscles, you have to OVERDO this section. Use a lot of air/support and say the words with a lot of legato feeling

Good luck in using your own creativity to find useful and entertaining exercises!

OCUMENTED

One of the most common comments we receive on the evaluation sheets (yes, your RMT reads every one of them!) is that the meeting room is either too cold or too hot.

What is a body to do?

LAYER. ..Come with a jacket, shawl, sweater or blanket, if you tend to get cold. Remove your jacket, shawl, sweater or blanket if you are too warm.

TRY THE OTHER SIDE OF THE ROOM...During this past Regional weekend one side of the room was very cold, the center was moderate, and the last side was very comfortable.

LET YOUR RMT KNOW...(or check with the Registration Desk). There may be something we can do.

KEEP THIS NOTE WITH YOUR TRAVELING THINGS, so next time you can pack to be more comfortable!

Attention Marketing Managers/Coordinators

Your can learn so much by watching the contest and the webcast makes this possible without the expense of traveling. Make this educational experience fun by having members "host" webcast parties on different days. Everyone can bring a snack and or beverage. Get creative and develop games and prizes for how well you were able to rate a performance, guess which uptune and ballad will be sung the most, guess the top 10, rank the top 10, etc. When the official scores are posted the next day, compare your scores and see how well you did. Using the Performance Level Guidelines (link on the R10 Resources page), discuss your thoughts as a group and learn from each other. And enjoy the opportunity to hang out with your chorus friends!

After many years of effort, collaboration between Sweet Adelines International and Girl Scouts of the USA has finally been created. It's a natural mixing of the two organizations. Sweet Adelines love to sing, Girl Scouts love to sing. Girl Scouts sell cookies, Sweet Adelines love Girl Scout cookies. We both like to dress alike and love bling. And, according to the survey that Region 10 participated in, almost 2/3 of SAI members were or are Girl Scouts. So, now it's time to take that a little further and actually make it official.

On October 16, as the ribbon is cut to open the tri-annual GSUSA convention in Salt Lake City, Sweet Adelines will be there. In the exhibit hall there will be a booth given to SAI by GSUSA that will showcase the SAI programs for both girls and adults and inform volunteers and parent about the opportunities available. There will be a stop on a scavenger hunt where girls will learn about barbershop harmony and find out how we take pitches. They will have the opportunity to blow a pipe, use a pocket-tunes, and how to put a pitch pipe on their own smart phone.

In addition, there are 6 workshops dealing with barbershop harmony and 4 opportunities for ensembles from Mountain Jubilee Chorus to sing. Of course, we are bringing along those past issues of the Pitch Pipe to give to interested women and there are several goodies for the girls. Region 10 has been gracious enough to supply 5000 postcards with YWIH and SAI information to give to the curious. The region is also sending pencils with contact info. SAI is supplying free sheet music and temporary tattoos. I have not seen these, yet!

And the best thing of all...the SAI Board of Directors has approved a program patch that Girl Scouts and Girl Guides of all ages can earn and wear on the back of their uniforms. The subject is, of course, barbershop harmony. It is written in current GS lingo and has requirements for every level of Girl Scouting. The patch design is a version of the current YWIH design. The patch program will debut at the convention in October and probably make its way to Baltimore in November, too. So you that are going to International, look for it there.

As soon as the final version of the patch requirements arrives, we will share them with you. Right now, please visit your local Girl Scout council and start a dialog with them. Each council will receive a copy of the requirements and the contact information for questions and ordering the patches once the girls complete them.

Soon there will be a link on the YWIH page of the SAI website that will give information on working with Girl Scouts and the patch.

Can you tell I'm excited? I've been working for this for years!

And finally, if anyone has a great story of working with the Girl Scouts in your area, please send it to me so I can forward it along to SAI.






CTC represents at AHA

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

Great Gulf Coast Region 10 "Pin Pals" Program (established 2013)

<u>Concept:</u> In the interest of learning more about our region's choruses and each other, each chorus will create/obtain lapel pins that their members will trade with other chorus members during regional events. The idea is to really meet the person you exchange with, so when you look at the pin several months after you receive it, you can tell someone "Becky gave this to me. She sings baritone in Harmony Blends Chorus." We also want to instill a sense of pride in your chorus.

Details:

- Funding --There is no funding from the Region for this each chorus is on its own creatively and financially.
- When -- Have the pins ready for your members to begin exchanging at Fall Regional [Sept 20-21, 2013]. (and every Regional meeting/contest thereafter)
- Amount -- Ideally, each chorus member should have at least (2) pins to exchange at each
 event. Smaller choruses, don't fret fewer members/pins will make collecting yours more
 'special.'
- Dimension preferably no more than 1.5 inches in diameter.
- · Shape any shape within 1.5-inch limit
- · Color any color
- Design something that represents YOUR chorus that you can use for several years. Ideas: geographic, food, culture, flower, bird, armadillo, bluebonnet, star, heart, roadrunner, beachball, fleur de lis, crawfish, pine tree, train, chili pepper, lasso, longhorn, shape of state, cotton, pecan, pelican. Note: the "pin" can be attached with magnet if preferred.

Notes:

- This is a voluntary program. You chorus does not have to participate, but it sure would be fun if everyone did!
- · Lapel pin does NOT have to have your chorus name or logo printed on it.
- Recommend do NOT put a year on it (so you can use it for awhile, especially if you purchase/make in quantity).
- Be creative. Encourage members to scout out local stores (purchase locally if you can).
 Someone can design or you can purchase "off the shelf." Consider holding a design contest to involve your members. Keep costs to your chorus as low as possible.
- If you make your own, be sure they are good quality materials so they will hold up.
- As a fundraiser for International in Baltimore, The Woodlands Show Chorus will be creating
 sashes/lanyards to display these pins. They will have a booth at the Fall 2013 meeting. If
 you have a specific "chorus color," let them know and they will try to have some available
